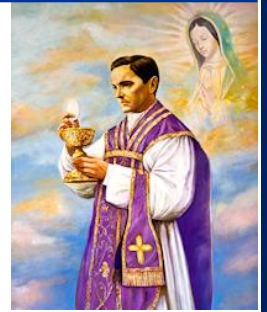

Introduction:

As Required by the By-Laws of the NH State Council the Committee on Finance shall consist of five members: The State Deputy who will act as chairman, the last State Deputy still residing in the jurisdiction, the State Treasurer and two financial advisors elected at the Annual Meeting. The membership committee includes

- 1) State Treasurer's Books: The state treasurer actively manages the five checking accounts. Balance as of 3/31/2026.
 - a. General Account \$ 44,193.93
 - b. Charity Account \$7,106.78
 - c. Kidney Account \$ 64,152.06
 - d. CPWID (Tootsie) Account \$ 66,651.09
 - e. Granite State Charity Account \$ 2,071.00

- 3) The state council maintains three investment accounts held at Fidelity Investments, these were monitored by Investment Account Chairman Rich McDermott. I will note, the executive board voted to move these accounts to the Knights of Columbus Asset Management.

- 5) The NH State Council engaged Ivas and Associates LLP of Windham, NH, a certified public accounting firm, to examine the financial records of the NH State Council and performed the following:
 - a. **Internal Revenue Service – 2025 Income Tax Report:**
An extension for IRS 990 was requested by IVAS and Associates on behalf of the NH State Council in November 2025, which was granted. The 2025 Exempt Organization Business Tax Return for the NH State Council was completed on IRS Form 990 and filed in December, 2025. A copy of this filing is available by contacting either Mark Messier State Secretary or Dave DeWorken State Treasurer.
 - b. **Audit of Financial Statements for Fiscal Year Ended June 30, 2025:**
Ivas and Associates LLP completed a review of the financial statements of the State Council in accordance with a set of procedures that were prescribed by the Supreme Council for State Councils in our size and income range. This constitutes an independent accountant's report on the generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP). The result of the process was reported the Supreme Council as require by the rules and laws of the order on December 1st 2025. The auditors applied seventeen (17) procedures as required by the Supreme Council guidelines provided. In all cases there were no exceptions or variances noted.

Worthy State Chaplain, Worthy Assistant State Chaplin, our Worthy Supreme Guest, Worthy State Officers, council delegates and my Brothers all. What a privilege and honor it is to be gathered here with you at this 127th annual meeting. I want to share a few of the things we have done and continue to work toward to help sustain the growth, visibility, long term viability, and charitable outreach and impact of Knights of Columbus local councils here in NH.

From the beginning of the Fraternal year, we set out in the spirit of continuous improvement and more attention to the **WHY!** We are not looking to re-invent the wheel but simply build on the progress we have made. By seeking delegate, member and council feedback this has helped us make incremental changes to better serve and provide what is needed and wanted at the council level. Some of these changes are active and ongoing, some are works in process and still some have not yet been fully implemented.

We have become more prayerful whenever we gather as a group. We started this Fraternal year by consecrating the year to our Holy Mother. Her Icon has traveled with us to every meeting as a visible sign of her presence among us and a reminder of our declaration of devotion and commitment to her. Holy Hours are now a part of the agenda at each of our two semiannual District Deputy meetings, as well as this State Convention. The Holy Rosary is included in the agendas of each of the Regional Zone meetings for our GKs and councils. We recite the Holy Rosary together and what an awesome experience it has been to have large groups of men praying together! And the men say they love it!

NH is experiencing steady membership growth. As of this message we have added 256 new members for 78% of our goal and need only 72 to reach our COH total goal. We have only 10 councils who have not recruited a new member this year. This has been a huge improvement over last year. Of our 65 active councils, we have 13 councils that have reached their council goals with several over 200% of goal and a few approaching 300%. There are 11 other councils who are at 60-80%, needing only 1-2 members to make their goal. This year we have 10 councils that have recruited their first new member in the past 1-2 years. What a major accomplishment. Additionally, we have 4 District Deputies within striking distance of achieving Star District!

District Deputies and State Officers have been working with councils to improve required State and Supreme reporting and Safe Environment Training. Here we have made some excellent strides this year. As of this report all active councils have submitted their form 185, only 6 councils still need the form 365, and 13 need the form 1728. These are all improvements compared to where we were at this time last year. Although we are improving, Safe Environment compliance continues to be a challenge and needs to be addressed. We are working directly with many councils to get this done.

We are working to improve our resources to provide better more timely communication and helping our councils. The monthly Forum calls for GKs, FSSs, and DDs invites these groups to gather and share best practices, problems and challenges. Although many of these calls are lightly attended, attendees often state that they are very helpful. We continue to encourage councils each month to utilize these opportunities to share and learn.

Our biweekly newsletters provide updates, reminders and upcoming events or deadlines. Our State Warden gets these posted to the website as well as directly to the councils. We continue to make changes and enhancements to the state website and encourage councils to access this resource. We are getting better but there is still much work to be done.

Our Multimedia chairman, Glenn Camley is working with an appointed committee to research and develop ideas and ways to utilize multimedia for improved K of C visibility to the public, advertising, recruiting and potential fundraising. This team is encouraged to think outside the box to attract and appeal to younger men and their families.

This year we transitioned from the traditional Quarterly Meetings scheduled for all councils to Regional Zone meetings geared toward smaller groups in more specific geographic areas. This has minimized travel concerns and overall attendance has increased at these meetings compared to recent years. These open forum-based gatherings are focused on the Grand Knights and attendees. There is less talking by officers and presenters and more listening. Also, Increased interaction and fellowship is generated during the brain storming and problem-solving workshops as well as the open forum Q&A sessions. These meetings have been well received and proven to be very productive and have produced many solutions and action items to be brought back to councils. We will continue to evaluate and make adjustments to better fit the needs and requests of our councils.

State officers and I have been visiting local councils. We attend council meetings, exemplifications and council functions and charitable outreach activities. Officers have made council visits to assist where there is no current DD assigned. The goal is to increase visibility and availability of our State Officers to our local councils. In some cases, officers are working directly with councils to help with specific challenges and issues. Also, we are bringing back the District Deputy District meetings. Districts are grouped together to form 6 geographic areas. Each State Officer is assigned to one of these groups. The District Deputy provides the location and meeting agenda. This provides another opportunity for our District Deputies and State Officers to meet with and build relationships with our councils in smaller groups and to better help them with their challenges and issues.

We are working to more clearly and better define the roles & responsibilities of state leadership positions. The focus is on the Director and Chairman positions. The intent is to provide guidance and best practices to help with planning, advertising and execution of programs and activities. We want to clarify expectations and provide a “blueprint” for each of the various positions for those who are doing the work now and for those who may be interested in accepting a directorship or chairmanship in the future.

These are a few of the things we have been working on. It is our hope and expectation that the abovementioned initiatives and actions, along with other improvements being considered will help us to continue to grow in our councils and as a jurisdiction. In our quest for continuous improvement, we will constantly seek out and solicit new ideas and suggestions to make things easier, more efficient and productive for our councils. This will help us to grow our membership and increase our charitable service and stay relevant in our parishes and communities as we seek to do our Lord’s command of building up His kingdom. Good & Welfare Committee Report



Brothers, in the last year we have seen a revival in the search for meaning, stability, and a way to make sense of the world. It causes all people, especially men, to pause and to reflect on their lives. Now is not the time to sit on our laurels, but to actively get out and spread this message of hope. The hope of Jesus Christ.

As the greatest creation, we are formed as men and women, with immutable characteristics that need to be celebrated. As men of faith, we need to be visible in our love, service, and faith to those about us.

Sharing our Faith in Christ:

Pray – We find it hard sometimes to pray. A tool that can be better utilized is daily scheduled prayer and adoration. Many churches offer weekly adoration for us to be present in prayer with Jesus. During this calendar year, councils should look at their Faith Program Director to implement or encourage programs for Knights to pray together. Cor is an example that is growing in the state, adoration, participating in the monthly State Rosary, rosary before mass or before council meetings are ways to increase time spent in prayer to our Lord. Once committed, prayer becomes ingrained in our lives.

Family – The bond of the natural family is the fundamental and the domestic Church. Children are the greatest fruit of the love of God manifested in the bond of Man and Wife. Unfortunately, many families have loved ones turn away from the Faith. It is time to bring them back. In each council, the Family Director can help implement programs that bring the family, in toto, to fruitful ground. A council may schedule a crockpot potluck among its members, or pizza after a meeting. A trip to the ball game with other K of C families. We cannot tell adult children what to do, but as they consider making sense of life, we can show them the joy of Catholic inspired social events. Councils should consider formalizing a program to support widows of deceased council brothers. This support would include social contact, practical assistance like transportation or manual labor as needed. The aim is to make widows feel remembered and valued after the loss of their spouse which aligns with the Knights' commitment to care for the families of members.

Unity – We learn in our degree program, through the example of the string and the rope, that we are stronger when working toward the same purpose. This is what Communion is about; to commune and worship together, in praise of Him on high. In unity, we serve the Church by our Faith in Action. Knights wearing our logos, shirts and uniforms while serving others through for Christ builds strong relationships and a desire for other men to be part of something greater.

Humility – Pride is the root of all evil, we are told. Give your time, treasure, and talents, by participating in the many programs. Remember, He who washed the feet of the Apostles. God does not pick perfect people to do his will, but he does pick people perfect for the work.

State Advocate's Annual Report

Brothers:

You may have heard my spiel on "paperwork". Not a fan at all. I am also sure you know the adage that no job is complete until the paperwork is finished. I will also remind you that our Order is not, is NOT a democracy. Rather we work under the suffrage of and in unity with Supreme Council. No Council exists without being part of the State Council. We work best together. I might mention that the first Constitution in the United States was that of the Province of New Hampshire - 250 years ago. The State motto (1776) was *vis unita fortior* -United Strength is Greater!

But how are we stronger. We are stronger by following the rules.

Some rules are imposed by the government (IRS 990 forms, EIN registration, etc.).

Some rules are imposed by the Order via Constitution, Charter and Laws, and bylaws.

Some rules are applied by the Supreme Council by dicta for security, intellectual property rights, operational efficiency.

Among those supplied by Supreme include the annual 365 listing of officers, appointment of key position list. Far too many Councils have never filled out this essential form. Another piece of paperwork is Protecting God's Children. This is not a nice thing to do, this is mandatory and essential. There is no excuse for not filling out the 365 and then following up with the open book education testing. **This is essential.** Amazingly some councils have yet to complete the form due almost a year ago.

Ancillary to mandated operations are stuff from the State. These include banking regulations and gaming. **Remember the Knight of Columbus IS NOT A CHARITY**, we are a **Fraternal Benefit Society**, a **501(c)8** who do charitable good works. Sometime banks get confused by this distinction. That also means we cannot advertise to the public that we are a charity. We can say we give to (insert name), a charity.

Supreme is aware of the unique status of New Hampshire and now allows Councils, if necessary, to list (called "Registered" in NH law-Secretary of State/Corporation form 100) the name of the council as a trade name. **A TRADE NAME is only a alias by which an entity which has an EIN (which every Council must have), a DBA listing and nothing more.** A corporation, however, is a separate legal entity. Being separate, that corporation cannot use the Registered Corporate name Knights of Columbus(r). This does not prevent a Council from creating a distinct charitable entity, however, that entity must then be approved by Supreme under their rules to be considered as an affiliated entity. In short be very careful creating a corporation, you may be on your own!

Gaming is also uniquely done in NH. I have been part of a legislative Gaming Commission regarding gaming in NH and several states look to NH to create a non-tax funding for social services. Supreme has funded a guide to gaming in NH. It is on-line on the website. If your Council is interested in gaming, please read that booklet before beginning. Remember the venue selects participants and you may very well share a game day or week with an anti-Catholic organization. Remember the Last Crusade movie watch phrase - Choose Wisely!

I stand available as I can be to help. Let us get rid of the necessary paperwork so we can focus on our real work! As the Knights of the Crusades to free Christian lands cried: *Deus vult!*

As our Brothers in Mexico cried as they were stood against the wall in Mexico and martyred: *viva Cristo Rey!*

As Bishop Greco proclaimed in his episcopal motto: *vivat Jesus!*

My Brother Knights,

On behalf of myself, my two District Marshals, and my entire staff, and in conjunction with our Worthy State Deputy, Mark Messier, I welcome each of you to the 127th Annual New Hampshire Knights of Columbus State Council Convention in beautiful Whitefield, NH! Spending the weekend conducting the business of the State Council, with good food and hopefully a little fun sprinkled in, is indeed a huge commitment, and I thank each and every one of you for being here and taking this important work so seriously.

It is indeed an honor to serve the Sir Knights of the District of New Hampshire. The District Master is appointed for a two year term by the Supreme Master, with approval of the Supreme Knight. Since taking office, my goal has been to surround myself with highly qualified and knowledgeable people. Two such people are my Marshals, Armand Carignan and Denis Querrard. Both have been an amazing help to me in carrying on the business of the Patriotic Degree in our State. As a team, we hope Faithful Navigators feel comfortable inviting any one of us to participate in their Patriotic events, initiate their Assembly Officers and using us as a resource for whatever they need.

The District of New Hampshire presently has over 1,400 Sir Knights, 34% of all active Knights in the State, spread across 23 active Assemblies, a much higher rate of participation than the National average of 24%. It is my hope that we all continue to recruit Knights to the **Patriotic Degree**. Knights attain full knighthood after being vetted by their local Council and their affiliated Assembly, and participating in a Master-sponsored **Exemplification of Patriotism**. These events are held each quarter of the year in various parts of the State. At the time of this writing, we have held 3 such events this Fraternal Year; Derry, Concord and Littleton, with a 4th event planned for this June in a location yet to be determined at the time of this letter's writing. These 3 events have brought 42 NH Knights to Sir Knighthood. I want to thank the dedicated members of the Master's Staff that make these events happen, the Faithful Navigators that promote the 4th Degree at their feeder Councils, and the Council officers that I know also promote the 4th Degree. I also would like to extend a special thanks to Exemplification Team Captain and Former District Master Ed Kennedy.

In February, 2025, the Supreme Board of Directors approved a modification to the Ceremonial for the **Exemplification of Patriotism**, allowing candidates' families and friends into the chamber to witness the entire Ceremony. We have used this new Ceremonial this entire Fraternal Year and have received very positive feedback from all! And what a blessing we have been given that as I lay the Master's sword on the shoulder of each candidate for Knighthood, his family is right there at his side participating in this amazing moment!

The Color Corps continues to grow around the State as we rebuild following the regalia change of several years ago. Many Councils and Assemblies have authorized funds to assist Sir Knights in the purchase of a new uniform, which has allowed many men to be added to the Color Corps ranks. Color Corps Commanders continue to encourage Sir Knights to join their ranks, and I thank each of them for conducting this important work. Sir Knights have participated in untold events in uniform all around the State, to include standing at fallen Knights' Wakes and participating in their funerals, marching in parades, serving our Veterans and First Responders, participating in events at our State Veterans' Cemetery, helping with the NH Special Olympics, participating in several Diocesan events at the request of Bishop Libasci, and attending trainings held by Color Corps Commanders and the District Marshals. While all Knights in action show our fellow parishioners and the public that the Knights of Columbus is a vibrant group of Catholic men serving their parishes and communities, nothing highlights that fact more than a Color Corps, doing what uniformed Knights do!

I look forward to continuing to serve the District and encourage any suggestions, questions or requests anyone may have. My contact information is listed at the bottom of this document. My Marshals, staff and I stand at your service! And again, thank you for being at this Convention, and thank you for all the work you do back home, doing the Lord's work.

During this, our 127th year as Knights of Columbus in New Hampshire, Knights and Sir Knights in Councils and Assemblies across our great State served as Greeters, Ushers, Sacristans, Eucharistic Ministers, and Lectors. We led Rosaries, Stations of the Cross, Prayer Hours, Eucharistic Adorations, Communion Services and any other ministries our pastors needed.

We cooked, we served dinners, we cleaned, we did carpentry, plumbing, electrical and other repairs, and we parked cars. We reached out to our communities with Gift Cards for Life, Gift Cards for Seminarians, Gift Cards for young mothers, 40 Cans for Lent, Tootsie Roll Drives, Marches for Life, 40 Days for Life, Clothing Drives, Food Drives, Fish Frys, Christmas Tree Sales and Blood Drives. 1. NH Right to Life Mass/Rally/March/Luncheon – January 10, 2026

As Chairman of this event, many of our brother Knights in Christ attended this most important event in conjunction with the NHRTL. This important pro-life event was held in Concord with over 600 people/families attending. The overall theme of the event was “Empowering Pregnant Women to Choose Life.”

2. National Right to Life March - January 23 – Washington, D.C.

My wife Mary and I drove to this event as volunteers working with the KOC Supreme headquarters handing out KOC signs and winter hats/gloves to thousands of marchers before the rally at 12 noon. Vice President, J.D. Vance was our keynote speaker at the rally in front of one million marchers which kicked off at 1 PM. It was such an honor and privilege to represent the New Hampshire State Council of my brother Knights.

3. 40 Days For Life Spring Campaign – February 15 – March 28

Our brother Knight in our Merrimack Council, Norm Thibault, directs this life-saving campaign in front of these abortion facilities: Women's Equality Center in Concord, Planned Parenthood in Manchester, and The Lovering Abortion Clinic in Greenland. These centers support and love pregnant women and their pre-born children at no cost for all the services they provide. These three invited speakers gave very inspirational pro-life talks which emphasized the dignity and value of all human life from the moment of conception in the mother's womb through all stages of life to natural death: Mr. Packy Campbell, founder of Seton Foundation, Hollie Noveletsky, candidate for US Congress, and Mr. Mike Younus, Executive Director, Options in NH.

5. Press Conference in the NH Legislative building in Concord – February 25, 2026

As KOC State Life Director and Board Member of NHRTL, I planned and conducted a press conference with Jason Hennessey, President of NHRTL, to publicize House bill # HB1416. (The Care Act) This bill will prohibit the state of NH, and municipalities from mandating pregnancy resource centers from performing abortions, providing contraception, or refer clients for such services. WMUR TV and the Union Leader newspaper recorded and interviewed each pregnancy resource center Director who gave a speech. A portion of the press conference was broadcast on the WMUR nightly news and was on the front page of the Feb 26 edition.

While 21 councils or districts have in-person teams registered on the State Council's website, 2/3 of the state's councils have not. One of the main purposes of registering is to provide councils with an easy way to reach out for exemplification help, if they suddenly find themselves a team member or two short, which fosters unity and fraternity within our ranks. Despite my championing this effort at regional and state meetings, reluctance to register remains. Additionally, only one or two typically list their upcoming degree dates at any given time.

As in the previous two years, since I began this role, I have offered assistance to councils in starting teams or answering questions for existing ones. This offer should be expected to continue.

Switching to our State Council's Online Exemplifications, FY2025-2026 marked a change to holding these ceremonies every other month. I am pleased to report we are averaging three candidates and four spectators per date, with ceremonies scheduled for March and May, as of my writing this report. New team members are always welcomed to assist and more spectators are encouraged to participate, even from councils without candidates. I would like to see this as a goal for the next fraternal year.

Finally, my writing this report marks the near end of my time in this role, as my wife and I have decided to relocate out of the area. FDD Michael O'Hare from Epping Council 6850 has graciously agreed to become the Ceremonials Director for the remainder of FY2025-2026 and I have no doubt he will do an excellent job in this position.

It has been an honor to serve you over the past nearly three years and my parting from NH is bittersweet. I thank the many of you who have aided me in this role and others and ask God to bless you for all you have done and continue to do for the Order, the Church, and those in need. Vivat Jesus!

I have had the privilege of working alongside newly elected State Deputy Mark Messier and SK Ron Keys to advance membership growth across the State of New Hampshire. Through a focused and collaborative effort, we have achieved measurable progress toward our goals, while continuing to build a stronger foundation for sustained growth.

As of this report, the State has welcomed **230 new members**, achieving **70% of our membership goal**, with **100 members remaining**. This places New Hampshire **42nd out of 75 jurisdictions**. While progress has been steady, these numbers also reinforce the opportunity that remains in front of us.

To support this effort, the **“Membership Minutes”** initiative has continued to serve as a targeted communication tool. These brief updates provide councils with actionable strategies, highlight available resources from both State and Supreme, and reinforce best practices for recruitment and retention. The intent remains clear—ensure that every council has access to the tools needed to be successful.

A key area of focus has been **engagement and utilization of available resources**. The Order provides proven programs, digital tools, and support systems designed to simplify and strengthen membership efforts. However, the effectiveness of these resources is directly tied to their consistent use at the council level. Councils that actively leverage these tools continue to outperform those that do not, demonstrating that success is both achievable and repeatable.

Additionally, we have continued to emphasize the importance of **recruiting younger members**, particularly within the 18–35 demographic. Efforts such as the Membership Ambassador program have shown that targeted outreach, when executed with intention, can produce meaningful results. Sustained growth depends on our ability to bring in younger men who will carry forward the mission and ensure long-term council vitality.

At the same time, communication and alignment across leadership levels remain critical. While the State Membership Team continues to provide support and direction, **District Deputies play a vital role in connecting that effort to the council level**. For this structure to be effective, councils must actively engage with their District Deputies—keeping them informed, involved, and aligned with their membership strategies. Strong communication at this level ensures accountability, consistency, and shared progress across the jurisdiction.

Despite the progress made, challenges remain. Data continues to show that a significant number of councils have experienced limited recruitment over an extended period. Without consistent membership growth and broader member involvement, these councils face increasing risk of decline. Addressing this requires not only recruitment, but also greater engagement across the full membership—creating an environment where responsibility is shared, participation is encouraged, and new ideas can emerge.

Moving forward, our focus remains clear: **provide the tools, strengthen communication, and reinforce accountability at every level of the Order**. By doing so, we position our councils not only to meet their goals, but to sustain growth for years to come.

Evangelization and Faith Formation Annual Report

Worthy State Officers, Delegates, and my Brother Knights;

As we close out the 2025-26 Fraternal Year, I look at how far we've come as a State Jurisdiction in terms of not just the adoption of *Cor*, but also the defense and growth of it.

From where we were a year ago, our successes are truly amazing. As I stated repeatedly over the last two years I've had the privilege to serve as the Evangelization and Faith Formation Director for NH, our main metric on success stems from the Form 944. This year, 2025-26, 61 Councils submitted the 944. This is a significant improvement from last FY, where only 47 Councils responded. But that's just the tip of the Iceberg! From FY 2024-25 to FY 2025-26, the number of Councils that said "Yes" to *Cor* increased 121%, a total of 42 up from 19. With this too, the number of Councils that said "No" decreased by 27%, 19 down from 26. We are seeing a great benefit to Councils who run *Cor* in terms of recruitment and participation. Across the Order, a "side effect" of *Cor* is a 27% recruitment increase and an 18% increase of Service Hours. Applying this metric to our State, Council 92 in Manchester has been running *Cor* since the beginning of the Fraternal Year and is on track to exceed 315% recruitment growth for the first time in over 50 years!

Adoption is not the only success we've had. Over the last few years, Supreme has created a new council-level position, called the Evangelization and Faith Formation Director. This position is similar to my own, except on the Council leadership level. They are responsible for organizing and running *Cor*, as well as working with the Grand Knight and the pastor of the parish to meet the needs of the parish with *Cor*. Supreme would like all councils to have a man filling this role and doing so with enthusiasm. Last year, only 15 councils in New Hampshire had appointed an EFF Director. This year, there are 33. This is a 120% improvement. On the flip side of this, that means that out of the 61 councils that filed a 944, 28 of them don't have an EFF Director. Additionally, this means 9 councils that are running *Cor* are doing so without an EFF Director. This is an area that we as a Jurisdiction need to work on improving. Every council should have an EFF Director, even if you do not plan on running *Cor*.

This year, we also expanded the New Hampshire EFF team. First, with the agreement of the State Deputy, Fr. John Brancich, FSSP, the pastor at St. Stanislaus in Nashua joined as the EFF Clergy Liaison. Fr. Brancich and I both went to the Supreme EFF training in New Haven at the beginning of the Fraternal Year. Fr. Brancich also had the opportunity to present *Cor* to all the priests of the Diocese at the annual Institute meeting. Further, we took the Zones established by the State Council and assigned Deputy EFF Directors who are particularly responsible for each Zone. These deputies for this Fraternal Year were: Ryan Labrie, Tristian Ouellette, and Mark Lukitsch. These men have been a huge help in expanding *Cor* and reaching all *Corners* of our State.

A RESOLUTION RELATIVE TO THE BY-LAWS

RESOLVED by the New Hampshire State Council Knights of Columbus assembled in a regular annual business meeting at Nashua, New Hampshire on this, the First day of May 2021:

ARTICLE I

NAME, OBJECT, LAWS, OFFICERS AND MEMBERSHIP OF COUNCIL

SECTION I. Name: The State Council shall be known under the name and title of "The New Hampshire State Council Knights of Columbus."

SECTION II. Object and Jurisdiction: The object of this Council shall be to assist the Supreme Council, Knights of Columbus and the Government of subordinate Councils established in the jurisdiction of New Hampshire. The State

SECTION IX. Per Capita Tax: ~~In order to defray legitimate expenses, the State Council shall annually assess each Council within the jurisdiction of New Hampshire a per capita fee-tax per member due and payable annually at or before the first session of the State Convention Annual Meeting. Individual council members shall qualify for such assessment if such members are assessed a per capita tax by the Supreme Council. In addition, a \$10.00 Third Degree initiation fee shall be charged by the State Council for each new member, except priests and members of religious communities, added to each council roll each year.~~ Provided, however, that the State Council shall not assess any per capita tax on Honorary Life or disabled members.

Council shall have jurisdiction over all subordinate Councils in the State of New Hampshire, and it shall be in turn subordinate to the Supreme Council of the Knights of Columbus.

SECTION III. Governing Laws: The State Council shall be governed by the Charter, Constitution and Laws of the Knights of Columbus and by these By-Laws, as approved by the Supreme Council and by all Permanent Resolutions adopted by the State Council.

SECTION IV. Function of State Council: In convention assembled, the State Council shall, except as hereinafter provided, discuss policies and programs, and endeavor to promote the general welfare of the order, shall transact such business and enact such rules and regulations as may be consistent with the Charter, Constitution and Laws of the Knights of Columbus.

SECTION V. Membership of State Council: The State Council shall consist of all the State Officers, the last Past State Deputy still residing in the jurisdiction, and two Delegates from each Council, being the Grand Knight and a Past Grand Knight of the same represented council and who are members in good standing, actually residing in the State and in good standing and including as non-voting members all current District Deputies, and Chairmen of Standing Committees. If there be more than one Past Grand Knight in a member council, the Council shall elect one to represent it in the State Council. A Council having no Past Grand Knight may elect one of its third-degree members in good standing in lieu thereof. Each subordinate Council shall elect alternates for its representatives in the State Council.

Past State Deputies, except for the immediate living past State Deputy, still residing in the State and in good standing, and District Deputies, have the privilege of membership but without the right to vote. The only exception to this rule may occur in cases where the local council may elect a Past State Deputy or District Deputy member of their council to represent his own council.

Directors appointed by the State Deputy shall be chairmen of the Standing Committees of Faith, ~~Youth~~, Family, Life and Community and who are not otherwise members of the State Council shall be accorded the privileges of membership in the State Council, including the right to speak on questions pertaining to the functions of their particular committees, but shall not have the right to make nominations, make or second motions, or vote therein.

Chairmen of other Standing committees who are not otherwise members of the State Council shall be accorded the privileges of membership in the State Council, including the right to speak on questions pertaining to the functions of their particular committees, but shall not have the right to make nominations, make or second motions, or vote therein. No more than twelve (12) Standing Committees shall exist at any one time.

The State Squires Chairman or State Squire Counselor when a State Squires Circle is formed who is not otherwise a member of the State Council shall be accorded the privileges of membership in the State Council, including the right to speak on questions pertaining to the functions of Squires programming and activities, but shall not have the right to make nominations, make or second motions, or vote therein.

SECTION VI. Disqualification: Subordinate Councils which fail to pay assessments to the State Council or Supreme Council shall not be entitled to representation at any meeting while they are in arrears.

SECTION VII. Officers:

- (a) The State Council shall elect by ballot from the membership at large a State Deputy, State Secretary, State Treasurer, State Advocate and State Warden, and representatives and alternates to the Supreme Council. A State Chaplain shall be appointed by the state officers. Officers of State Councils shall hold office for a term of one year from and after the first day of July following their election and until their successors have been elected and qualified.
- (b) Appointments to fill vacancies in any office of the State Council shall be made for the unexpired term by the State Officers. In the event that the State Council qualifies for an additional delegate (Insurance or Associate) to the Supreme Convention between the time of the New Hampshire State Convention is held and the Supreme Convention, the alternate having received the most votes as an insurance or associate alternate shall be appointed by the State Deputy as the additional delegate to the Supreme Convention in the category (Associate or Insurance) to which the alternate was elected.

SECTION VIII. Executive Committee:

- (a) Duties: Between meetings of the State Council, the Executive Committee shall have full power and authority to conduct the ordinary and usual business affairs of the State Council. Such financial commitments, arrangements or contracts as shall be made for on behalf of the State Council by the Executive Committee shall be binding as the act and deed of the State Council.
- (b) Membership: The officers of the State Council, including the Immediate Past State Deputy, shall comprise the Executive Committee of the State Council. The Chairman of the Executive Committee shall be the State Deputy. In the absence of the State Deputy, the State Secretary shall assume the role of chairman *pro tempore*.
- (c) Meetings: The Executive Committee shall meet quarterly, at the call of the State Deputy, or upon written demand of three members thereof.
- (d) Financial Limitations: No obligations shall be incurred by this committee in excess of \$500.00 nor shall any obligation be incurred that is not considered an ordinary and usual business expense of the State Council.
- (e) Reporting Requirements: The Executive Committee shall report in writing-electronic form at the State Council meeting of any action taken or moneys expended by them in the period between meetings of the State Council. Key actions and decisions shall also be published within not more than thirty days by email and/or on the State Council Website for access by all delegates after each Executive Committee meeting.

(f) Accounts Receivable: The Executive Committee shall pay all bills and requests for funds disbursements due in a timely manner but will reject those bills from members of the order not submitted to it in writing within 90 days of the date the bill is incurred.

SECTION IX. Per Capita Tax: In order to defray legitimate expenses, the State Council shall annually assess each Council within the jurisdiction of New Hampshire a per capita ~~fee-tax~~ per member due and payable annually at or before the first session of the State ~~Convention~~ Annual Meeting. Individual council members shall qualify for such assessment if such members are assessed a per capita tax by the Supreme Council. ~~In addition, a \$10.00 Third Degree initiation fee shall be charged by the State Council for each new member, except priests and members of religious communities, added to each council roll each year.~~ Provided, however, that the State Council shall not assess any per capita tax on Honorary Life or disabled members.

ARTICLE II

MEETINGS AND PROCEEDINGS THEREIN

SECTION I. Meetings: The State Council shall hold the annual meeting between April 1 and June 1 and to be known also as the State Convention.

SECTION II. Notice: The State Secretary shall ~~mail-publish~~ to all members of the State Council, not less than thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting a notice setting forth the time, place and date of said meeting and shall publicize the time and date of the State ~~Convention-Council's Annual Meeting~~ to the entire membership by posting on the state web site and by announcement at each council by ~~the a District Deputyies or his assignee.~~

SECTION III. Location: The State Deputy and Executive Committee shall determine the location of the State Convention.

SECTION IV. Quorum: Attendance of at least fifty per cent (50%) of the voting members of the State Council shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION V. Admission to Meetings: All meetings of the State Council shall be conducted in the Third Section. All Third Degree members of the Knights of Columbus, in good standing, as determined by an inspection of Membership Cards or presentation of credentials duly issued by the State Secretary by the State Warden or assistants as appointed by the State Deputy, and any other persons to whom the privilege is extended by the State Council, shall have the privilege of attending all meetings of the State Council; provided, however, that no person not a member of the State Council as provided in these By-Laws shall be permitted to speak without the permission of the State Deputy.

VI. Speaking: When a member desires to speak he shall arise and address the Chair, giving his name and the Council he represents. When recognized the member shall confine himself to the subject under consideration except as otherwise provided by parliamentary law. No member shall speak longer than five minutes without the permission of the Chair, nor more than once upon any question until all others who desire to speak have been heard.

SECTION VII. Roll Call: The State Secretary shall call the roll at each session of each meeting to determine the presence of a quorum. Upon a demand for the yeas and nays the State Secretary shall call the roll when such demand is made by at least one third of the members present.

SECTION VIII. Reports: The State Deputy, State Secretary, State Treasurer, all standing and special committees, and each District Deputy shall prepare a complete written report of all his official acts and file the same with the State Deputy before the State Council meeting.

With the exception of the State Deputy's report, unless a reading is ordered by the State Deputy or a majority of the State Council, the report of the State Treasurer shall be published as an appendix to the minutes of the meeting and such publication shall constitute the reading thereof; and the filing of the reports of the State Secretary and the District Deputies shall be deemed to be the reading thereof.

SECTION IX. Parliamentary Procedure: Except as otherwise provided by these By-Laws or by Permanent Resolution all meetings of the State Council shall be governed by Robert's Rules of Order, Revised and the State Advocate shall act as parliamentarian.

SECTION X. Order of Business:

At all meetings of the State Convention the order of business shall be as follows:

- (1) Call to Order (at all sessions)
- (2) Examination of Membership Cards by State Warden (at all sessions)
- (3) Prayer (at all sessions)
- (4) Salute to Flag (at all sessions)
- (5) Roll Call (at all sessions)
- (6) Appointment of Standing Committees and Special Committees:
 - (a) Committee on Credentials
 - (b) Committee on Good and Welfare
 - (c) Committee on Mileage
 - (d) Committee on Resolutions
 - (e) Committee on Finance

- (f) Committee on the By-Laws
- (g) Committee on Membership
- (h) Committee on Programs
- (7) Communications
- (8) Reports of State Officers, District Deputies and Directors
- (9) Reports Called for by State Deputy
 - (a) Report of the Committee on By-Laws and Resolutions
 - (b) Reports of all other standing and special committee
- (10) Unfinished Business
- (11) New Business

The first item of New Business shall always be Election of Officers, Representatives and Alternates to Supreme Council and Members of the Committee on Finance, it being held, however, that concurrent with the counting of votes other new Business and/or reports may be undertaken or heard as suits the chair as a matter of expediency.

- (12) Prayer and adjournment (at all sessions).

ARTICLE III ANNUAL MEETING

SECTION I. Rules: Except as otherwise provided herein, the Annual Meeting shall be conducted under the rules provided for in Article II, Section X above.

SECTION II. Purpose: The Annual Meeting shall be held for the purpose of electing officers of the State Council, Representatives and Alternates to the Supreme Council, and two members of the Committee on Finance, for the appointment of Standing Committees, the adoption of amendments to these By-Laws and for the transaction of such other business as may lawfully come before any meeting of the State Council.

SECTION III. Expenses of Members including Past State Deputies:

The State Council shall reimburse the members thereof for their expenses incurred in attending said Annual Meeting at a rate proposed by the executive board to the membership at the Annual Meeting prior to which the reimbursement shall take effect. The State Secretary and the State Treasurer will be responsible for determining the most efficient and timely way to disperse checks to members and council delegates, minimizing the need of creating and destroying incorrect checks and the cost of unnecessary postage.

SECTION IV. Elections: All officers of the State Council, Representatives and Alternates to the Supreme Council and two members of the Committee on Finance shall be nominated by declaration before the Annual Meeting or from the floor of the Annual meeting from the floor of the Annual Meeting and elected by ballot. The election of a State Deputy shall be held first, followed by the election of a State Secretary, a State Treasurer and a State Advocate and a State Warden. Thereafter, the Representatives and Alternates to the Supreme Council and two members of the Committee on Finance shall be elected. Nominating speeches presenting candidates for any office shall not exceed five minutes in length. No electioneering is allowed.

SECTION V. Tellers: The State Deputy or presiding officer shall appoint tellers to receive, sort and count the votes, and report the results to the Chair. In addition, each candidate shall have the right to appoint one teller.

SECTION VI. Voting: ~~When nominations are closed, the State Secretary shall call the roll and as each name is called, the member shall deposit his ballot in the ballot box. The State Secretary shall maintain a list of voting delegates before the balloting begins.~~ A majority vote of the members present, and voting shall be necessary for election to each office except that, where several of equal degree are to be elected as Representatives and Alternates to the Supreme Council and members of the Committee on Finance, a majority shall not be necessary. Each of such offices shall be voted for on a combined one ballot, the winners being determined by plurality. No ballot containing the names of more, or fewer candidates than there are offices to be filled, shall be counted.

SECTION VII. Credentials: The State Secretary shall transmit with the notice of the Annual Meeting of the State Council a list of the offices, including the number of Representatives to be elected and voting credentials to be used at the Annual Meeting.

ARTICLE IV STATE OFFICERS

SECTION I. State Deputy: The State Deputy shall preside at all meetings of the State Council and at all meetings of the Committee on Finance. In his absence the State Secretary shall preside at all such meetings and in his absence the other officers of the State Council, in the order they are named in this Article, shall preside. The State Deputy shall appoint Standing Committees provided for in these By-Laws and all special Committees. He shall give a quarterly report on his activities to the Executive Committee and shall give an annual report to the State Council of the condition of the Order of new councils instituted during his term and make such suggestions as he shall deem necessary for the best interests of the State Council. He shall endorse his approval upon all bills for debts of the State Council and forward the same to the State Secretary.

It shall be the responsibility of the State Deputy to appoint such ~~Third~~ Degree Members as may be necessary to serve at the pleasure of the State Deputy to assist in the implementation of the various programs of the State Council and Supreme Council. These

members, to be known as Directors and/or Chairmen shall report to the chairman of the Standing Committee on Programs who shall be called the Program Director, except that the various chairmen shall report or coordinate with the directors of the various sections listed below. At a minimum the State Deputy shall appoint Directors in the five ~~six~~ areas of typical council work. ~~Chairmen of specific activities shall report to the various directors and may be appointed by the State Deputy.~~ Of those appointed, no more ~~that~~ twelve shall be afforded the privileges of membership in the ~~state~~ State Council of which ~~five~~ four shall be the designated Directors and one shall be the Program Director.

- a). Faith
- b). Family
- c). Life
- d). Community
- e). ~~Youth~~

The State Deputy ~~shall~~ may appoint, annually, a State Squires Chairman who shall be responsible with the State Youth Director for establishing Squires Circles throughout the state. When enough Circles are active to create a State Circle the State Squires Chairman shall be the State Chief Counselor and direct liaison between the State Squires Circle and the State Council.

SECTION II. State Secretary: The State Secretary shall act as recorder at all meetings of the State Council and Executive Committee. He shall:

- (a) Receive all monies paid to the State Council, make a record thereof and transmit the same to the State Treasurer.
- (b) Give a surety company bond in the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00), the cost of which shall be paid by the State Council.
- (c) Make a record of all bills for debts of the State Council, prepare a warrant setting forth the amount of each bill, the reason for the payment thereof, and forward the same to the State Deputy for his approval and forwarding to the State Treasurer for payment.
- (d) Issue, under seal, voting credentials to the members of the State Council for all Annual Meetings.
- (e) Be paid an honorarium of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00), per year.
- (f) Send notices of all meetings as provided in these By-Laws.
- (g) Separately record at length all Permanent Resolutions, make a file thereof and cause said file, together with a copy of these By-Laws, any amendments thereto and a copy of the Charter, Constitution and Laws of the Knights of Columbus and a copy of Robert's Rules of Order, revised to be available on the State Council Website for ~~at~~ all meetings of the State Council.
- (h) Prepare minutes of all meetings of the State Council and ~~mail~~ email a copy thereof to all members of the State Council within one hundred eighty (~~180~~30) days after each meeting thereof; provided, however, that any delay in mailing said minutes shall in no way affect the validity of any proceedings of the State Council.
- (i) Prepare Minutes of all meetings of the Executive Committee and ~~mail~~ email the same to the members of the Executive Committee and the District Deputies within thirty (30) days after the date thereof.

SECTION III. State Treasurer: The State Treasurer shall be the chief fiscal officer of the State Council. He shall:

- (a) Maintain books of account in an orderly manner, showing ~~all of~~ the assets and liabilities of the State Council and all receipts and expenditures and shall submit the same to the Committee on Finance annually for inspection.
- (b) Give a surety company bond in the sum of One Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$100,000.00), the cost of which shall be paid by the State Council.
- (c) Deposit and credit all monies received from the State Secretary or from state Accounts in their proper accounts, and ~~with the exception of~~ the General Fund, shall withdraw the same only on order of the State Council, except as otherwise provided in these By-Laws or by Permanent Resolution.
- (d) Make payment from the General Fund of all bills for debts received by him duly recorded by the State Secretary and approved by the State Deputy.
- (e) Be a member of the Committee on Finance and be the Treasurer of every other Committee which handles moneys of the Order or its members.
- (f) Be paid an honorarium of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00), per year.

SECTION IV. State Advocate: The State Advocate shall be counsel for and Parliamentarian of the State Council. He shall be a member of the Sub-Committee on Resolutions and Chairman of the Committee on the By-Laws; and shall perform all duties required of him under these By-Laws, including the classification of resolutions. He shall hold the same position in the State Council as the Supreme Advocate holds in the Supreme Council and be paid an honorarium of Four Hundred Dollars (~~\$400.00~~), per year.

SECTION V. State Warden: The State Warden is responsible for the safe keeping of all State Council property. He is also in charge of ensuring that only properly credentialed members gain admittance to all State Council Ceremonials and other meetings of the State Council. He is the chief communication/information officer for the State Council, overseeing all State Council level communications, including but not limited to Newsletters, Public Relations, and Web Page. He shall also perform other duties as directed by the State Deputy.

SECTION VI. State Chaplain: The State Chaplain shall be appointed as provided by law and shall hold the same position in the State Council as the Supreme Chaplain holds in the Supreme Council. He shall have charge of all religious services at all meetings of the State Council.

SECTION VII. Immediate Past State Deputy: The last living Past State Deputy residing in the jurisdiction shall act as an advisor to the State Deputy and is the chairman of the ~~state-State~~ Council Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities Program (CPWID) ~~Teetie Roll Drive~~ disbursement committee.

SECTION VIII. Upon leaving office, all officers, committee chairmen and District Deputies shall transfer to their successors, ~~all of~~ their files, records and properties of the State Council.

ARTICLE V

STANDING COMMITTEES

SECTION I. Appointment: Except as otherwise provided in this Article, or elsewhere in these By-Laws the State Deputy shall appoint the members of the Committees enumerated herein.

SECTION II. Committee on Credentials: The Committee on Credentials shall examine the voting credentials of all members of the Annual Meeting.

SECTION III. Committee on the Good and Welfare: The Committee on the Good and Welfare shall report as to the progress of the Order.

SECTION IV. Committee on Mileage: The Committee on Mileage shall determine and certify to the State Secretary the number of miles traveled by Members of the State Council in attending the Annual Meeting and shall make use of Google Maps, Map Quest or other freely accessible computer-based mapping services.

SECTION V. Committee on Finance: The Committee on Finance shall consist of five (5) members: the State Deputy who shall act as Chairman; the last Past State Deputy still residing in the jurisdiction; the State Treasurer and two Third Degree members elected annually at the Annual Meeting. The Committee shall:

- (a) Audit the books of the State Treasurer at the conclusion of each Fiscal Year and file a report thereof with the State Council not more than ninety (90) days after the conclusion of said Fiscal Year.
- (b) Examine the books of all other officers and Committees to whom moneys have been committed.
- (c) Present to the Annual Meeting of the State Council a budget for the following Fiscal Year and suggest such measures of finance as it may deem expedient.

~~(d) (Eliminated April 28, 1979)~~

~~(e)~~ The Committee on Finance will be responsible for the investments and the investing of the funds of the New Hampshire State Council Knights of Columbus. The fund must be insured or guaranteed government investments, and the investments must be liquid.

~~(f)~~ Any check that is returned with insufficient funds or returned for not being properly signed the issuer of that instrument will be subject to a ~~\$25~~30.00 (thirty dollars) charge in addition to any other fee assessed the State Council by a bank or other financial entity to offset ~~the any~~ surcharge ~~charged-assessed upon to~~ the State Council.

~~(g)~~ The Finance Committee is to submit to each subordinate Council a proposed Budget for the next fraternal year at least ninety ~~(90)~~30 days prior to the Annual Meeting of the State Council. Said proposed budget to be voted on at the annual meeting and subject to modification from the floor at or preceding that vote.

SECTION VI. Committee on the By-Laws: The committee on the By-Laws shall consist of the State Officers and the District Deputies and any others appointed by the State Deputy. The Committee shall report on the condition of the By-Laws and submit their recommendations thereon at least once every five (5) years. In addition, the Committee shall perform all duties prescribed by Article VI thereof. The committee shall consist of no less than seven (7) members and shall act as part of the Subcommittee on Resolutions.

SECTION VII. Committee on Programming: The Committee on Programming shall consist of the various Directors appointed by the State Deputy, with the State Program Director as Chairman and the State Deputy as *ex officio* chairman. The Committee shall be responsible for developing and coordinating various state programs through the appointed chairmen of activities such as, but not limited to the State Pro-Life Seminar, State Commemorative Mass, State Marian Devotions, State ~~Free-Throw Sports Related~~ Contests approved by the Supreme Council, ~~State Sporting Events~~, State Special Olympics participation, State Poster Contests, ~~State Blood Drives~~, Annual Meeting, State Ball, Annual Banquet, ~~and~~ State Awards Programs and State Scholarship Programs.

ARTICLE VI

AMENDMENTS/RESOLUTIONS

SECTION I. How Amended: These By-Laws may be amended, as hereinafter provided at any Annual Meeting by a vote of two thirds of the members present and voting, a quorum being present.

SECTION II. Filing: Any member of the State Council may propose an amendment to these By-Laws by filing the same with the State Secretary not less than forty-five (45) days prior to the Annual Meeting.

SECTION III. Notice: Upon receipt of any proposed amendment the State Deputy shall cause the State Secretary to cause the same to be ~~printed and shall mail a copy thereof~~published to each member of the State Council along with the notice of the Annual Meeting; whereupon any such amendment shall be in order at the Annual Meeting for which such notice is given.

SECTION IV. Referral to Committee: Whenever amendments to these By-Laws are proposed, the State Deputy shall call a meeting of the Committee on the Revision of the By-Laws which shall take the same under consideration, receive the opinion of the State Advocate and report thereon at the Annual Meeting.

SECTION V. Procedure after Passage: Whenever any amendment to these By-Laws is adopted as provided herein, the State Deputy shall immediately forward the same to the Supreme Council for approval.

SECTION VI. Effective Date: No amendment to these By-Laws shall be effective until approved by the Supreme Council or Supreme Board of Directors.

SECTION VII. Publication: Whenever, in the opinion of the Committee on the Revision of the By-Laws it shall be necessary, the Committee shall cause all amendments to these By-Laws to be incorporated herein and shall cause the same, as amended, to be ~~printed in booklet~~updated in pdf document form. Said ~~booklet-document~~ shall bear upon its face a conspicuous reference to the date of its publication. Whenever, in the opinion of the committee on the Revision of the By-Laws, it shall be necessary, all permanent resolutions ever adopted under this section and under the archives of the State Council shall be compiled in a chronological fashion and shall be ~~printed~~published in a cost-effective manner to be determined by the State Secretary. Upon receipt of said publication, the State Secretary shall forward ~~one~~a copy to each State Officer, District Deputy, Past State Deputy still residing in the jurisdiction, Director, Chairman of all Standing Committees and each subordinate council; and upon request, to any member of the Order, in good standing, who desires a copy thereof.

SECTION VIII. Resolutions:

- (a) Purpose: Whenever the membership of the State Council or subordinate council or general membership wishes to express a position, point of view or opinion as reflective of the membership as a whole or establish a policy which requires an appropriation in excess of \$250.00 (two hundred fifty dollars), except for the usual and ordinary business of the State Council, a resolution shall be in order. Said Resolution are to be presented, in writing, to the State Deputy before March 15 of any year for consideration at the Annual Meeting.
- (b) Form: Such Resolution shall begin in the form "Whereas the New Hampshire State Council . . . " and shall be deemed to reflect the opinion of the entire membership of the state council upon passage. If the resolution is for a program or action by the state council, the Resolution shall be accompanied by a comment from the Program Director and the subordinate director associated with the proposed program.
- (c) Out of Order: If the Resolution deals with the operation of the State Council such resolution shall be deemed out of order and an amendment of the By-Laws appropriate.
- (d) Procedure:
 - (1) Such resolutions shall be submitted to the State Deputy.
 - (2) The State Deputy shall refer such resolutions to the Subcommittee on Resolutions.
 - (3) The Subcommittee on Resolutions shall take such resolutions under consideration, seek the opinion of the State Advocate as to their consistency with law, cause the State Advocate to draft its report and any amendments to the resolutions suggested by the Committee, and shall report thereon at the Annual Meeting of the State Council.
 - (4) Untimely Proposed Resolutions: Any proposed resolution that is not presented in a timely fashion, i.e., before March 15 of any year, may be considered at the Annual Meeting only if:
 - (a) Presented, to the Executive Committee who shall then present the proposal for consideration by the membership, in writing with sufficient copies available for presentation of one copy each to all members of the State Council
 - (b) Once presented for consideration a vote of 2/3 of the members present in the affirmative shall be required for the proposed resolution to be brought to the ~~considered~~consideration of the Annual Meeting.
 - (c) If a 2/3 affirmative vote for consideration of the untimely is received the proposed resolution shall be in order for presentation to the membership in a regular manner and copies of the proposed resolution issued to the members of the State Council.

All permanent resolutions shall expire after a period of five (5) years unless resubmitted. Permanent Resolutions that were adopted prior to ~~1991~~five years before the current date are hereby null and void.

State Seminarian Christmas Program

In July, we had 27 councils and 7 Assemblies confirming that they will be supporting a Seminarian/s and or a Postulant/s this coming year 2025-2026. As of October 4, 2025 We had only 38 councils out of 68 councils and 10 Assemblies out of 23 confirming that they will be supporting this Christmas Program.

Final Report for 2025-2026 as follows: There were 43 Councils and 6 Assemblies that actually either directly or indirectly supported our religious people for the Seminarian Christmas Program. Collectively, \$12,400.00 was collected but out of this amount over \$4,500 was mailed directly to the person they were supporting. Please understand I can only report what is reported to me and would encourage that our councils and assemblies follow the directions of the program and send all donations to the chairman and not directly to who they are supporting.

Next year I will be starting this program much earlier since we have some being supported by 6 or 7 councils / assemblies and then we have only 2 or 3 councils / assemblies supporting others. It is very hard to estimate the donations. Collectively there were over 35 Councils / Assemblies unable to report to me if they took part in this program.

Because of the zoning of our state, I had sent to each District Deputy a two page flier for each of their councils and or assembly in their district. These fliers contained the names of each seminarian and or postulant they were assigned to support. For those councils that did not have a DD, I sent a flier to each Grand Knight. I have reached out to all Councils and Assemblies to offer their involvement in our Vocations support and explain if needed the RSVP Program offered by Supreme as well as offering their involvement in the Seminarian Christmas Program held in December. Some Grand Knights had asked "What is the RSVP Program".

I am also looking into other events to support our Seminarians such as a Breakfast or may be a State Cookout - Location and Date TBD.

All suggestions will be considered as our year progresses.

Worthy State Deputy, State Secretary, State Program Director, Immediate Past State Deputy, State Treasurer, State Warden, and State Advocate, this memo provides you with the 2025 fiscal year results of the State of New Hampshire Knights of Columbus - Campaign for People with Intellectual Disabilities:

21 councils submitted funds totaling \$79,169.46. For reference, in the 2024 fiscal year, total funds collected were \$75,051.71.

Tootsie Roll expenses totaled \$1,380.50.

Total net funds were \$77,788.96.

State Council retained 30% of the net funds which equaled \$23,344.30.

\$54,444.66 was sent back to councils for distribution to the charitable organizations of their choice.

Salem council 4442 was the leader in funds collected at \$12,484.10 In 2nd place was North Conway council 7575 with \$10,022.50. In 3rd place was Dover council 807 with \$7,302.28.

As of today, my records indicate that I have orders from 15 councils totaling 118 cases of tootsie rolls for fiscal year 2026.
